JLC UNIT MASS

FOUNDATION

This week sees the students learning the last of the short vowel sounds (a, e, i, o, u) and using them to read and spell numerous words. We will finish the last of the consonants early next term, and they are to be commended on their incredible work so far. Another major focus in our literacy block is proper letter formation. Students are encouraged to keep practising their handwriting in the holidays.

In maths, the Foundies have had a great time learning about location and words such as under, on, over, far, near, between, etc. Our favourite game of the week was a location Simon Says.

A very important part of our week (and another favourite) is our directed play time, or inquiry. During this session, the students are working on essential skills such as oral language development and fine motor. They also get a chance to work on social skills such as problem solving, getting along and including others in a safe and directed environment. This time will continue again next term.




Directed Play Time



YEAR 1

The Year 1 students have been studying the vocabulary and story of 'Wombat Stew' in structured literacy sessions. We have continued to focus on what is in a simple sentence and how to reduce the repetition of the word 'and' by using commas.




In the Big Write, the children have chosen their favourite Big Write from the term and have edited and made a good copy of it, using the strategies they have learnt.



HOLIDAY HOMEWORK

Year 1 students can do some of the following during the break to keep their learning minds active...

1. Read everyday (see reading instructions photo).
2. Find some new words and their meaning to add to their vocabulary.
3. Practise doing their 2 and 5 times tables.
4. Practise telling the time to the half hour.
5. Keep a holiday diary to practise handwriting and sentences.
6. Ask someone at home to test them on their 'heart words'
7. Eat chocolate & have fun!



In Maths, the students have continued to work on numbers to 100 and skip counting by 5. We have also studied analogue time to the half hour, with tasks on: o'clock and half past. We look forward to 'Apple Slinky Fridays' where we slinky up our apples for fruit break! It has become a tradition that will continue into Term 2...remember your apples next term!



YEAR 2

The Year 2 students have been studying the vocabulary and story of 'The day the crayons quit' in structured literacy sessions. We have focused on what is a run-on sentence and how to fix them as well as being introduced to what a clause is. In the Big Write, the children have chosen their favourite Big Write from the term and have edited and published it to present to their families.

In Maths, the students have continued to work on numbers to 1000 and skip counting by 3,5 and 10. We have also studied analogue time to the quarter hour, with tasks on: o'clock, half past, quarter to and quarter past the hour.

YEAR 1 & 2 RELIGION...

The students in Year 1 and 2 have been responding to LENT and Easter in Religious Education and have written prayers associated with the unit of work.

A number of the Year 1 & 2 students have read at mass this term and we couldn't be prouder of them. They have read some complex readings and have challenged themselves to take on what older readers would often be nervous about. Well done to our superstars.

Below are the Year 5 reflections from Sovereign Hill Camp.

The first time I put on my old fashioned costume it felt surprisingly good, but after a while, I got very itchy. Unlike the Ragged school children, at least I was warm and I was glad we were given a thick woolly coat to wear. We wore knickerbockers, which were extremely uncomfortable because I am used to wearing long pants.

*When I was allowed to go gold panning there was a mini gold stream with tiny flakes of shiny gold, I panned the rubble in water so that the gold would sink to the bottom. To my surprise, I saw a glimpse of gold so I got a gold vial to put it in. The little vial cost a dollar. The gold was extremely difficult to put in the teeny vial. After a while the gold started to add up so when I see that gold I will remember the experience of Sovereign Hill. *Gold panning was so enjoyable, and I could have stayed there for hours. At first it was difficult but then I got the hang of it after Billy showed me the right technique. He showed me how to use the round metal pan to gently whoosh the water across the dirt and rocks at the bottom and hopefully flecks of gold could then be seen. After about 15 minutes of persistence, out of the corner of my eye I saw a tiny little speck of gold. Eureka! I brought a vial to put it in so I could take it home. Next, I went up to the old-fashioned lolly shop. The line was ridiculously long, and it took 10 minutes for me to get served. Finally, I brought delicious raspberry drops. *At camp I especially loved the olden day costumes that we wore because they really fitted in with the schools and the timeline that we were in which was the 1850's. The costume felt soft but also felt rough. The knickerbockers felt like pants that don't fit but they kept you warm from the cold weather. We wore a hat that we had to doff if someone walked by. We wore a mining shirt under our jacket which was long sleeved but got rolled down by the jacket. **By Harry Purss***

My experience at the costume school was amazing. When I put my costume on it was very long and the pantaloons were weird and uncomfortable. My dress had a green lizard design on it and had a lot of cream coloured buttons up the back. We wore a white apron over our dress so it wouldn't get dirty for church on Sunday.

*When the year five girls were at St Alipius school, we got to work at learning cross stitch. At first I felt nervous because I thought I would ruin my creation, but surprisingly after a while, it got easier. Ma'am was more relaxed and nicer when we were sewing. **By Willow Szarazek***

At the costume school I was the bell monitor, and it was really hard to hang the bell on the nail because it was extremely heavy. The traditional clothes were very uncomfortable and itchy, we had to wear knickerbockers, mining shirts and jackets.

*Ma'am was extremely strict. She whacked her stick on a stool and yelled "Sit!, Stand! Sit!, Stand!" We couldn't say ok, because it was just two letters of the alphabet instead we had to say, "Very well, I see, yes indeed." I really enjoyed Sovereign Hill camp because you got to explore the traditional lolly shop and go gold panning with your friends. When someone found gold we shouted Eureka! This was to alert everyone that people had had success.

The Secret Chamber Mine was an exciting experience, but when you went down in the carriage you couldn't even see your hands in front of your face. This made everyone a bit nervous, and our guide explained that we needed to remain as quiet as possible with our arms safely inside the carriages.

Girls were taught how to sew, whereas boys were taught how to technically draw with straight lines. It was a surprise that my favourite part of Sovereign Hill was gold panning because I found tiny flecks of gold with my friends. When we found tiny flecks of gold we shouted Eureka! A great fact I learnt in Sovereign Hill was when people back in the gold rush time shouted Eureka when they found gold.


