Our Year Fives were mostly above the average, however not as strong as our Year Three students. Overall, we are very happy with the results. Our explicit and focussed teaching is paying off for our students. NAPLAN results were sent out via post last week. To understand the reports provided please go to the <u>video on reading the Individual Student Report</u> which explains clearly what your child's results indicate. Please take the time to watch this short explanation if you have not already done so.

We have had interest from other schools who have heard about our school and the work we are doing and over the next few weeks we will have these schools visit and watch our teachers teach. This is very exciting as we are so excited to share what we have learnt over the years.



#### THANK YOU

The JLC teachers have also been busy undertaking an exciting professional development seminar for writing. Carolyn, Jo and Ashley join educators from around the world on a weekly Zoom meeting on Wednesdays from 7-9am with the team from 'The Writing Revolution'. We thank the school leadership for their investment into such amazing PD. We know the students will greatly benefit from this!

A gentle reminder that if your child needs or wants something special for their LETI project, it would be helpful if they could bring in the materials. We are always grateful for donations of craft items that you may be cleaning out. No cardboard boxes at this time, however. We are very full with boxes!



#### YEAR 1 - MATHS

In Maths, we are learning about 'Number Bonds' and how they relate to addition and subtraction. An activity that you can do at home is give your child a number and ask them to create number bonds for this number. From there, your child should be able to write an addition equation or a subtraction equation. We have been practising counting on from given numbers, and back from given numbers. This practise helps us work out the answer to simple addition and subtraction equations.

#### WRITING

In Writing, students have been building on their sentence writing skills. We have looked at 'Subject Nouns' and 'Predicate' and are now introducing 'Conjunctions' to writing. Students are writing sentences, using the word 'because' to expand their sentences.

#### EXCURSION

Students learnt a lot at the Old School Museum. This learning has been shown in, 'The Big Write'. Last week we wrote about our Family Tree, and this week we are writing about School in the Olden Days.

## YEAR 1 - READING

In Inquiry this term, students have thoroughly enjoyed exploring times gone by! We have read books about the goldrush, The First Australians, The Titanic, The Sydney Harbour Bridge and some Anzac stories.



## WONDERINGS & INQUIRY

The stories we read, fuel information for students Inquiry 'Wonderings' which lead the students to LETI (Inquiry) investigations through independent creativity. Students have come up with questions that they want to know more about. After an excursion to the Old School Museum, students have built on these questions to come up with new ideas. Some projects that are being done are models of record players, telephones, dioramas of an old classroom and a horse and cart.

## YEAR 2

In Literacy, the Year 2 students have been studying ancient civilisations. Our first investigation has been on Ancient Egypt. We have read information on the geographical location of Egypt and the River Nile. The students have located these points on a map and have pinpointed where the capital city Cairo is in Egypt. This week, we have learned about Pharaohs and everyday people and their roles in society.

In Writing, the students have been working with subjects (who) and predicates (doing what) in sentences and have been expanding sentences. For our first attempt, we started with a simple sentence or kernel and then asked what? And where?

To expand the sentence 'The river flows.'

These are some examples:

**Poppy:** The Nile River flows through the land and that allows people to have water.

*Maisie:* The Nile River flows to the people so they can grow food and get rich soil.

Spence: The Nile River flows into Egypt and the Red Sea.

Heidi: The Nile River flows to the land, so the people can have water.

Madison: The Nile River flows through Cairo.

*John:* The Nile River flows into Cairo, the largest city in Egypt. The river floods every year for the farmers to get the rich soil. *Javier:* The Nile River flows through Egypt into Cairo.

Lui: The Nile River flows through Egypt so they can collect it.

Lachlan: The Nile River flows through Cairo and Cairo is the capital of Egypt.

Pippa: The Nile River flows through the land and brings soil so they can have food to eat.

Heidi: We will walk to the Old School Museum because it connects to our LETI key understandings.

*Ivy:* We will walk to the Old School Museum to answer some questions.

Zoe: We will walk to the Old School Museum because it will answer our questions for LETI!

*Javier:* We are going to walk to the Old School Museum because we are learning about the olden days. *Brodie:* We are going to walk to the Old School Museum because we are learning about the olden days. The students were asked to 'Stand and deliver' their sentences.

#### MATHS

Last week, we finished working on multiplication and have started to complete division equations with arrays and grouping. The students have already shown they are very capable in this concept.

The children are enjoying our new area of study, Ancient Rome. We're learning about timelines and have been introduced to Roman mythology, with the story of Romulus and Remus. We're also learning about the many gods and goddesses and it has been fascinating learning for all of us.

## WANGARATTA ART GALLERY VISIT - FRIDAY, AUGUST $18^{TH}$

We're very excited to be heading to the Wangaratta Art Gallery on Friday, August 18<sup>th</sup>. We are going to view the Wangaratta Contemporary Textiles Award winners and will be taking part in creating our own art, based on the work of one of the artists. We will also be going to the Bullawah Cultural Trail (weather/track permitting). The trail is located beside the Ovens River and has a number of stations, each with Indigenous sculptures and symbols, to explain the meaning. Information will be sent home soon.

## FLUENCY READING AND COMPREHENSION

We continue to work on reading our text with fluency and expression and are developing comprehension questions to ensure we understand what we read. Recently the students read 'Wild Animal Advice' and produced the following open, closed, literal and inferential questions:

Eli - Should you stay away from the pet if it is alone? Kellie - What is 'Wild Animal Advice' about? Lachlan and Carlos - Why can't you feed wild animals? Hunter - Should you feed wild animals? Elle - What was the squirrel digging for? Zakk - Why can't you take wild pets home? Lucy - Why should you ask the pet's owner if you can pet it? Amelia - What would the pet do if you tried to feed it? Freddy - Why should you leave the pet alone? Niamh - Why aren't you being kind by feeding the wild animals? Ben - Are pets wild animals?



Book Week is not far away and we are very excited about this wonderful week of celebrating Australian authors and books.

#### SENIOR NEWS

We are so proud of our unit, they are working exceptionally well and this is reflected in the continued academic growth of many students. This week at assembly we witnessed the new student award - the 'Growth Award', this is for students who have shown growth in their learning. #### INQUIRY

The students have been busy working on their projects about their chosen Greek god. There are certainly some unusual family connections. Mr Jackson has some Roman coins that the students were able to look at and handle, under a light they were able to see the outline of worn images. Coins nearly 2000 years old.

#### MATHEMATICS

We continue to work on percentages along with BODMAS. The students have learnt a few new games and we encourage them to teach them to you. We are beginning to work on percentages and measurement - perimeter and area.

#### SILENT READING

All students should have a novel to read at least four nights a week. We prefer the students to have an actual novel rather than using Sora, at the moment. Some students have received a part copy of a book and they are required to have done their reading for the following set session. These students know who they are. The students have also received a Book Report that they can be working on as they get to the end of their books.

#### LUNCHTIME SEWING

A small group of enthusiastic sewers have been working at lunch times under the guidance of our resident seamstress, Daisy Howell. Thank you Daisy for showing the initiative to share your talents and help others learn.

## SLC ART

The senior students have recently completed a three-piece assessment item focused on the Aurora Borealis and Aurora Australis. This assessment item required them to create three versions of the same Aurora image which they chose from google images. The first piece was created using acrylic paint as the predominant media, where the students learned about consistently angled brush strokes to achieve a neat cover for the background of their piece. The second piece was created using crayon as the predominant media, where students learned to melt the crayon using baking paper and an iron to achieve a unique aurora effect. The third piece was created using digital media, with students experimenting with different drawing effects available on one of the pre-loaded apps on their iPads. It was very pleasing to see the students develop new skills throughout the duration of this assessment item, and they are to be congratulated for their efforts. The final products are as amazing!
