STUDENTS ARRIVAL AT SCHOOL

ORIMI SURVEY

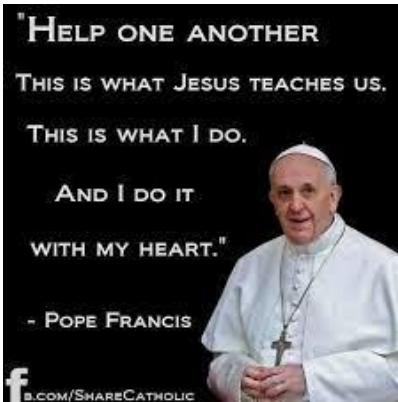

This is the time of year when we excitedly begin to welcome our new Foundation students for 2024. Last week and this week, we participated in the Foundation Readiness program, where the Kinder educators walked students to and from kinder for a visit. We loved welcoming them to our space and getting to know them more. Thank you to Mrs Jackson for taking the current Foundies. They felt very grown up to be working with the Year 5/6 teacher!

We will host another readiness morning next week before our official transition days commence later in November. Please ask us if you, or anyone you know, has any questions about enrolling.



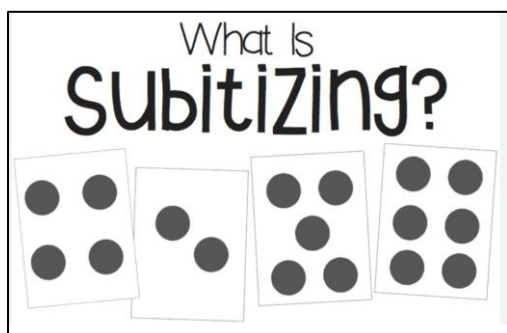


FOUNDATION

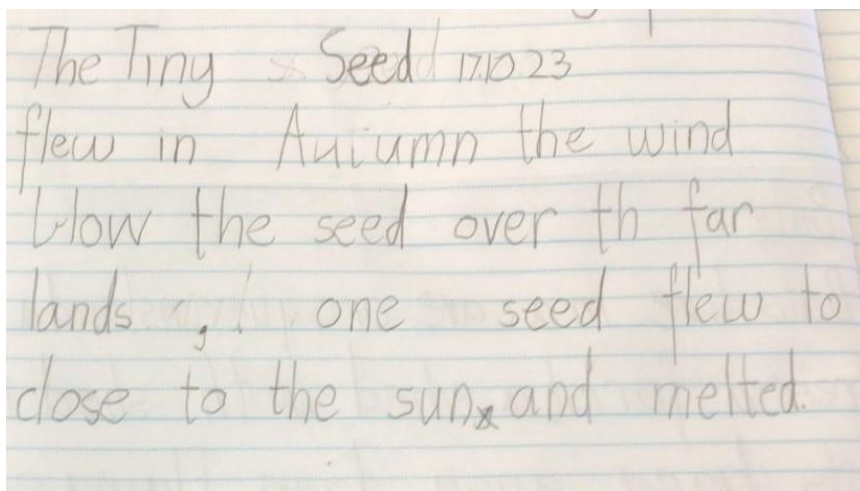
In maths, Foundation students are reviewing the concept of addition with strategies such as number lines and part-part/whole. This has been a fun, hands-on lesson where students are beginning to 'see' how different numbers are made; for example, 15 is made of 10 and 5, 7 and 8 or even 2 and 13 (plus more combinations). The parts, when added together, become the whole. You can also play this game at home. For an extra challenge, try giving them the whole and only one part and ask them to figure out the rest.

YEAR 1

In Maths, students have enjoyed the challenge of learning place value. They have begun to experiment with three digit numbers (Hundreds, Tens, Ones). Students have revisited a strategy called 'subitizing' where they look at a collection and identify the amount visually. We have also been learning to add and subtract two digit numbers using vertical algorithms.



In English we have been learning about sentence expansion. We have been reading picture books about living things to tie into Inquiry and using a storybook to write related sentences. The students are given a 'Kernel' (sentence starter) and the students identify the 'Who, What, Where, When, Why, How' etc. using Colourful Semantics.



The Year 2 students have continued to work hard this fortnight. They start each day with touch typing and have all improved their hand positioning, speed and accuracy with their typing.

In maths, the students have continued to work with fractions. They have placed fractions on a number line and found equivalent fractions for $\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{1}{4}$. They will proceed into simple addition of fractions.

In literacy, we have continued to analyse the classification of animals and the associated vocabulary, such as: carnivore, herbivore and omnivore. The students have continued to build on their sentence writing capabilities and have been expanding their sentences.

We have learnt the doubling rule for adding vowel suffixes this week and have continued to use a variety of prefixes and suffixes. In Religious Education, the Year 1 and 2 students have continued to work on their project for the residents of Myrtleford and Barwidgee Lodges as a part of their 'Call to Mission.'

We will be planting seeds to grow carnations in class and ask for empty 1.5 L soft drink bottles to be brought in, to be used as our pot.

Well, we have had some interesting weather over the last two weeks - hot and sunny, windy and even freezing cold and raining! Thankfully we are back on the oval, now it has dried out. Skipping, downhill, basketball and soccer have been the favourites during recess and lunch play.

Good luck to all the students heading off to Regional basketball tournament on Friday.

During Blueearth we started off with a moon-ball team challenge, basically keeping a gator-skin off the ground using a volleyball action. Teams of 6-8 worked through different strategies to achieve the highest score. The best was an outstanding **187** touches! Then we played an epic combat game that included the entire SLC and 3/4AN. This was extremely competitive, and everyone operated with great sportsmanship and huge smiles.

WRITING

This term we are revisiting 'show don't tell' when we are writing. The focus is using our words to paint a picture for the reader by explaining what you can see, hear, smell, taste or touch, describing how the character is feeling through body language or facial expressions and trying a variety of sentence starters. Last week we had to secretly choose an object in the class and write three descriptive sentences as clues for the rest of the class to guess. This was a fun task, see if you can guess any of the objects below.

RELIGION

HOMEWORK

Homework will continue to focus on **revision for maths**, reminding students of all the areas that could come up in our PAT testing next Monday and Tuesday. Our reading and writing this week is a piece related to **space exploration with attached questions**. Students should (and everyone knows this) use the number of lines as the aim for their answer to a question. We are able to share our opinions clearly during a discussion but transferring this into well-structured and engaging sentences is our ongoing task. A little bit (10 minutes each night is achievable and makes the world of difference).
