
2023 SACRAMENTAL PROGRAM

Past and present students, staff, parish members and families are invited to attend our special mass, reunion, school tours and join us for a pasta lunch.


Please let any past students know that this event is on, as we would love to see them all. We have even invited Presentation Sisters who worked in Myrtleford to attend.

JUNIOR NEWS

Our **LETI** topic this term is focussing on Science. Our key understandings are:

- What we see in the sky changes between day and night.
- Seasons affect the way we live our lives.
- We see changes in our landscape over time.

We will look forward to sharing our learning with you at the end of the term with our expo.

FOUNDATION

It has been wonderful to see how the Foundies have quickly gotten into a routine of changing their readers each morning and tracking home reading in their yellow books. As a result, this week will be the last week of sending home singular words to practise. We encourage them to read nightly for both enjoyment and decoding.

This week in the Foundation room, we continue to practise our handwriting for 10 minutes each day as part of our morning routine. It’s fantastic to see how much growth the students are displaying with correct letter formation.

We are also learning about consonant blends - two (or three) letters that make two sounds. With consonant blends, we often say them together quickly. When we “smash” the sounds together, we read the word more fluently. Some examples are the st- stop and bl- blue. Next week we will focus on blends at the end of the word.

Each morning, we complete a class graph as part of our maths learning. We’ve had some really fun questions such as, *What superpower would you choose? What’s your favourite farm animal?* We are learning how to make a range of observations about the data.

In Religion, we are focussed on how we care for God’s world, looking at His stunning Creation all around us.

YEAR 1

Just like Year 2 Bennett, we too, have had a wonderful one and a half weeks with Mrs Regina Reynolds-Smith (pre-service teacher) in our classroom. Regina has been working with the Year 1 students and taking some of the classes as a part of her training to be a teacher. Mrs Reynolds-Smith will be with us until next Friday. If we are lucky, we will see her again for another placement.



In **Literacy**, we have focused on the book 'There was an old astronaut that swallowed the moon' by Lucille Colandro. Our focus vocabulary words are: bizarre, gravity, force, orbit, meteoroid, comet. We have been looking at the meaning of the words and discussing why the author would choose to use them. We have also continued to build on our sentence writing and learned about Fragments which are parts of the sentence, not the whole sentence. The students wrote to the Big Write prompt 'The Full Moon' last week and are writing to the prompt 'Space' this week. Please discuss what they are writing with them, as they are planning to write on Thursday.



In **Maths**, the students have learned about Australian coins and practised counting specific amounts of money. They have also been doing some revision on time and analogue clocks with Mrs Reynolds-Smith. The students have also been completing some mid year overall maths testing to calculate their growth over the semester.



In **Religion**, the Year 1 and 2 students have shared stories involving Jesus in the scriptures. We have shared 'Godly Play' together which is when we have a special box that Mrs Bennett opens and tells a story from scripture with a special message, using small props for the students to visualise the story. We finish with 'I wonder' questions which prompt the children to think on a deeper level about the meaning of the story. We also made a collage of our definition of 'Love' and the ways we can show love like Jesus did.

Last week, Mrs Reynolds-Smith and Mrs Sharp, created a beautiful fridge magnet for our gorgeous mums. The children really focused on the process for making salt dough and cooking it, then decorating them, and were so impressed with their final results. We hope that our mums loved this little gift of love.



YEAR 2

We have had a wonderful two and a half weeks with the amazing Miss McCoy (pre-service teacher) in our classroom. Melanie has been working with the Year 2 students and taking most classes as a part of her training to be a teacher. Miss McCoy will be with us until next Friday. If we are lucky, we will see her again next year as a qualified teacher.

In Literacy, we have focused on the book 'Mr Archimedes bath' by Pamela Allen. Our focus vocabulary words are: overflowed, depth, bellowed, puzzled and measured. We have written detailed sentences stating why a picture does or does not show an example of one of these words. We have also continued to build on our sentence writing by expanding our use of conjunctions or joining words.

The students wrote to the Big Write prompt 'The Full Moon,' last week and are writing to the prompt 'Space' this week. Please discuss what they are writing with them, as they are planning and writing detailed and interesting narratives and informational texts each week.

In Maths, the students have worked on the place value of numbers to 1,000 and have been extending themselves by working with and understanding the value of numbers to 10,000 with Miss McCoy. Last week we investigated Australian coins and notes and practised counting specific amounts of money. The students have also been completing some midyear overall maths testing to calculate their growth over the semester.

HOMWORK

This week for homework students have to write a statement, question, command and exclamation sentence that relates to animals that live in mountainous areas. We have been working on different types of sentences during our writing lessons and mountains are our Inquiry focus.

There is also something new for students to try independently or as a family (don't worry if these are too challenging or your week is already full enough). A sheet of word-picture quizzes has been sent home and they can be quite enjoyable to nut them out as a team. From my experience grandparents are fairly handy at these too!!

MATHS

The Daily Review is a short warm-up session that we regularly complete during our math lessons to ensure we are revisiting skills we have learned throughout the year. We conduct these on our whiteboards which makes it very easy for teachers to check for student understanding.

Our focus for the remainder of the term will be fractions, decimals and percentages. On Tuesday morning, all students completed an Essential Assessment fractions pre-test so we can tailor our lessons to meet the learning needs of all students in the SLC.

RELIGION

The students have finished up their topic on Creation, where we are all caretakers of the earth. One of the actions from this unit was for the students to name something they could do to help the environment. Some of the students' ideas include the following:

- Take shorter showers.
- Turn the tap off when brushing your teeth.
- Make sure the rubbish goes in the correct bins.
- Use containers for sandwiches or snacks rather than glad wrap.
- Put more clothes on rather than have the heater running at a high temperature and walking around in shorts.
- Choosing to buy products with less packaging.
- Walk or ride to school instead of getting a lift in the car.
- Turning the lights off, TV off or devices off when you leave a room.

BLUEARTH

Last week in Bluearth, the students played a variety of games. Using core poses and following the instructions, the students completed different activities. The major game was the Ground is Lava. The students love this game. It requires them to work as a team, moving the chairs without falling off, otherwise they have to start from the start again. It is hilarious to watch but rewarding seeing teams working together.


Victoria's Child Safe Standards

Plain language summary

1 Your organisation welcomes Aboriginal children. You support them to express their culture and to enjoy their rights. You don't allow racism.



2 Child safety is important to everyone at all levels in your organisation. You document how you find, avoid, and stop risks of child abuse or harm.



3 Your organisation supports children to know their rights to be safe from abuse, informed, and involved. You help them to talk openly and take part in decisions that affect them.



4 Your organisation tells families and the community about what you do, and how you keep children safe from harm and abuse. You help families to have a say and to take part in decisions that affect their child.



5 Your organisation understands that every child is different and has different needs. You make sure that they can get the information and help that they need.



6 Staff know what they must do to keep children safe from abuse and harm. They record, report, and share information about child safety when they should. Staff who work with children have had the background checks they need.



7 Children and their families know how to make a complaint and what happens when a complaint is made. Your staff know how to respond properly to complaints.



8 Your organisation trains and supports staff to keep children safe from abuse and harm. Your staff know the signs of child abuse and harm and what to do if there are issues of abuse and harm.



9 Your organisation makes sure children are safe when they use your services, settings, and activities. This includes when children are online.



10 Your organisation checks and improves the ways you keep children safe from abuse and harm.



11 Your organisation has written policies about how you keep children safe from abuse and harm. They are easy to understand, and all staff follow them.
