Third Week of Lent

(Week beginning Monday 4th March)


Samoa may be a country surrounded by water, but access to clean drinking water is scarce in some areas, with many families facing extreme hardship as a result.

Leaia lives with her five children, husband, brother and sister-in-law on the island of Upolu in Samoa. Not having access to a reliable source of clean water caused Leaia a lot of worry.

Their home is not connected to a piped water system, so they had to rely solely on rainwater collected in old fridges. When their water ran out, Leaia had to walk with her young children to collect water in buckets and containers from a neighbour down the street.

With the support of Caritas Australia's local partner, Caritas Samoa, a water tank was installed at Leaia's home. She and her family now have a steady supply of clean drinking water at home. Next year, they will also have a toilet built, with the support of Caritas Samoa, which will further improve their health and living conditions.

"We are very thankful and grateful for the water tank. It has helped us so much and made our daily life easier," Leaia said.



Together, we can help vulnerable communities face their challenges today and build a better tomorrow *for all future generations*.



Wow, how are we in Week 6 already???


The JLC students have achieved so much already this term and we are very proud of them.

FOUNDATION

This week is the last week for the Foundation students to rest at home on a Wednesday. Miss Deith has almost finished all of the initial testing and has seen very pleasing results! A reminder that all correspondence goes home in your child's blue reading bag and it is essential that your child brings it to school every day.



LITERACY

There has been a great deal of excitement in our classroom of late due to the reading and writing achievements being made! Students have mastered the letters

and sounds for '/s/a/t/p/m/' and have been able to do some dictation; sounding out the words 'sat, mat, pat, Sam, Pam and tap'. Learning to recognise the sounds letters make is fun in Foundation! We have been singing songs, doing craft, writing with chalk outdoors and using our whiteboards. It is amazing how quickly the students are learning!

MATHS

In maths, students have been learning about 2D shape and patterns. It is amazing how many patterns and shapes we can recognise around us! Students went on a shape hunt in the school yard and experimented with different patterns in a storybook and small group activities.



BLUEARTH

In Bluearth our focus this term has been on eye/hand and eye/foot coordination, fitness, balance, locomotion and eye-tracking skills using a variety of equipment and focuses on engaging students in moderate obstacle course stations and the playground equipment. The program is called Perceptual Motor Program (PMP). Students have been climbing ladders, swinging on monkey bars, using wobble boards and balancing on beams.

RELIGION

We have finished our unit on 'I am special'...it has been delightful to see students create collages with images cut from magazines that they love...it is very easy to see how each and every one of your children are individually special in these pictures. Students discussed why their names are special and why their parents may have chosen their names; the comments they made were beautiful:

INQUIRY

The learning from Inquiry is becoming more and more evident. Students have been working on construction to show their understanding of the key outcomes: maps, special places and everyone being different in different places. Lots of ideas are being shared between each other and some are bringing in projects that they have been working on at home. We have maps of airports, race tracks, space, our own hometown and dioramas of coffee shops and miniature houses!





YEAR 1

The Year 1 students have continued to work hard this fortnight and this is showing in their progression. We have continued our daily work on phonemic awareness and phonics and are looking at the digraph 'ch' as in chair this week. Next week we will be looking at 'ang, ing, ong and ung'.

We have also been studying 'Continents, countries and maps' in our literacy work. We are reading and writing in response to the topic, and have learned about the importance of maps. Last week we studied the book Mr Archimedes Bath and turned fragments into sentences.

The Year one students have read Mr Archimedes Bath and were given a sentence fragment that they were to change into a full sentence. The fragment was 'The animals all....'

The Year 2s are reading one of our all time favourite books 'Oh the Places You'll Go!' By Dr Seus as our class text. We will continue with this book for the next couple of weeks so if you have an old copy at home be sure to get it out and get your child to read it to you. There's lots of interesting vocabulary and rhyme in this book.

SPELLING PROGRAM



RELIGION


Our class has further explored the types of prayers. Last week we wrote some of our own beautiful prayers.





SENIOR NEWS

NAPLAN

Grade 5 students will next week undertake several NAPLAN assessments. The first will be on Wednesday the 13th March at 11:30am. All of the Grade 5 assessments will be at 11:30am, unless it is otherwise arranged due to student absences. These assessments are an indicator of how students are traveling academically. Even though these results are valuable, students should not put too much pressure on themselves as teachers look at many different aspects of learning to determine how they are progressing.

CAMP

Congratulations to our students for helping create a wonderful experience while in Canberra. Your contributions, peer support for each other, positivity at taking on all the challenges added to our camp being successful.

Thank you to Sandra Sharp, Hannah Wall, Adam Davis and Leigh Corcoran for their work. Each one of us had a specific role to play and this is what makes St Mary's a great place to work, every team member pulls their weight. Thank you also to our bus driver Merv Shepherd who did a great job getting us around Canberra effortlessly, and for also giving us an excellent 'embassy drive tour', even the bad 'dad' jokes were ok.

Student reflections about different aspects of the Canberra Camp:

On the way to Canberra, we sat in a bus for about five hours and thirty minutes. We watched Shrek II and Jumanji. The movies took our mind off how long the trip was. Our first stop was at Holbrook, there was a big submarine we climbed on to check out the surroundings. Then we arrived in Canberra a little bit later. On the return trip we watched Finding Nemo and the rest of Jumanji, finally we pulled back into Myrtleford. Sleeping was my favourite bit of the travel.

At camp we had a brilliant time, our favourite part was the Sportex experience at the AIS. The most engaging activities at Sportex were the goal kicking challenge for footy and rugby, the reaction test, and the 1v1 basketball court. The goal kicking challenge for footy was fantastic because it would give us a score out of 10 on how accurate our kicking was.

On Thursday we went to the National Archives and learnt about the emu war on the 2^{nd} of November in 1932. We used interactable boards to find all the information about the emu war that we needed to know. There were three soldiers with a machine gun sent to farms in Western Australia to cull emu numbers because they were eating all the crops and destroying the fences. There was a telegram sent to the Prime Minister, from a woman, to put an end to the cruelty.

At the National Archives we learnt about how hard it was for immigrants to come to Australia. They had to sit a near impossible dictation sentence with lots of tricky words to spell and difficult grammar. Even if they passed the first one in English they had to sit a second test in another language. How unfair!

My eyes lit up when I saw the Questacon shop. It was all fidgets and activities. The slime was calling my name and I could just see the lava lamps bubbling in my mind. I was going crazy because there were endless choices and I only had \$30 to spend!

On the Canberra camp we went to Parliament House and happened to meet Costa from Australia Garden Junior, who told us to help create new ideas and present them to our local member of Parliament. After that we were lucky enough to meet Helen Haines and participated in a House of Representatives roleplay. Benji was the speaker, Lexi was the Prime Minister, Chayse was the Opposition Leader, Enzo was the clerk, and the rest of us were voting about whether animals should be allowed to be in the circus. The government won easily!

When we entered Parliament House, we were greeted and shown around by our tour guide Luke. The first house we saw was the House of Representatives. We entered when it was about the end of question time and saw the politicians discussing price gouging. Bob Katter had everyone in stitches with his passionate speech about affordability. Then we moved on to the Senate where they were also talking about the price of living and how Coles and Woolworths have been raising their prices.

On the Second day of Canberra camp, we went on the ANZAC Parade Walk in the main streets of Canberra, it was also the passageway from Parliament House and The War Memorial. Our guide showed us the Kemal Ataturk Memorial Statue which was made for the Greeks and was constructed from one of their famous columns cut with a cross. Our Guide explained to us about The Royal Australian Navy Memorial Statue, and he said the sailors on the statue represented different jobs in the navy.

At about 7:30pm we hopped onto the bus and drove to the indoor swimming complex in Canberra. When we arrived, we shot down a massive water slide. Unfortunately, it had a huge line up to go down, but it was worth it. When you walked up the top there was a red and green light, when it was green, we were free to go. At the end of the water slide there was a little pool that the water shot out of if you raced down quickly.

"Welcome to the War Memorial", our tour guide said, "let's get started."

She led us through the aircraft museum area and into a room with seats, a projector and a white screen. She said that we will be meeting a past soldier soon but let's watch a little clip first. We watched the clip that explained about the memorial and there's an unknown Australian soldier buried at the Memorial to remember all the unidentified fallen soldiers. The veteran walked in and said that his father died in war, and he was a member of the Air Force. They were called to the boys in blue, because the Air Force uniform was and still is blue.

Then we saw the honour boards of people who died in all the wars Australia has fought in. We saw an old war boat and a poster advertising for people to join the army, some dioramas of the war. We learned about Doctor Grace who saved many lives in the war. We saw a massive painting of a city with ghost soldiers surrounding it. It was painted in just one sitting, one sitting! How like how!

On the first night at Peewee Lodge we had snags, mash potatoes, peas, corn and honey soy chicken. The chicken was ok and the snags were surprisingly good. The peas and corn were not too bad either. For breakfast we had eggs on toast with bacon. The eggs just made the toast soggy but the bacon was good.




